### From The Principal


Dear Parents/Guardians,



Term 1 is nearly over. It is always a busy term; our normal range of activities has an overlay of both House Swimming Sports and House Athletics carnival, as well as several school-level events.

### School Review and Annual Report to the School Community:

There are two particular cycles of reflection that are occurring at the moment. Firstly, the school has been engaging with external school reviewers, who work with stakeholders to plan the four year strategic plan. Looking back, our results are excellent – on par or better than all our neighbourhood competitors. Secondly, each March the school presents to the School Council a summary of the outcomes for the past year. Some of the results from these two discussions are below.



The event also showcased displays from Fire Safety Australia, universities, TAFEs, and a range of career exhibitors from the construction, transport and tourism industries.

After breaking for lunch, we had the chance to witness the first Supercars practice of the day and observe the mechanics at work. We then explored the track, took in the best views from the grandstands during the F2 practice, and soaked up the incredible atmosphere of the event. With so much walking involved, the bus ride home featured more than a few well earned naps.

Beyond the excitement of the day, it was fascinating to see the planning and logistics behind such a large-scale event. ### **CWA Mansfield Bursary**




