Assessment and Feedback:

During the year your child undertakes various assessments. Feedback is provided to our students and these assessments are uploaded to Compass, under 'Learning Tasks', so that parents can monitor their child's progress. Year 7 Scienceworks Excursion


On the 6th of May, Mansfield Secondary Collage's Year 7s went on an excursion to Scienceworks in Melbourne. We got on the bus at 8:45, chattering about the experience ahead. Some looked forward to the sporting section, some the Planetarium, but we all looked forward to something about this amazing opportunity. The journey to Melbourne was one filled with laughter, singing and air buzzing with excitement. When the bus arrived, we were in awe of how big Scienceworks was. The teachers checked our names off and we made sure not to leave anything on the bus, then we were off! After we put our bags away, we went straight up to Beyond Perception. We spent about half an hour giggling, controlling little fans, making projections on a post, swirling colours and reading about all these visual effects. After that, the teachers herded us up again, and walked us over to Sportsworks, where there were a whole lot of things to interact with. Things that tell you your height, how fast you run, how good your peripheral vision is, how hard you throw and so much more. After spending close to 45 minutes there, we walked outside to have lunch. After our lunch boxes were empty and our stomachs full, we gathered again to make our way to the Planetarium. Celebrating Harmony Week

Harmony Week, celebrated towards the end of the first term, focuses on inclusiveness, respect, and belonging for all Australians, regardless of cultural or linguistic background. During this week, Australians wear orange to support cultural diversity and an inclusive society. The event highlights the contributions of migrants, who bring their own cultural and religious traditions to Australia. According to the 2021 ABS Census data, over half (51.5%) of Australian residents were born overseas or have at least one parent who was, showcasing the country's multicultural makeup.

Short presentations were delivered in some Homegroups about Harmony Day and its importance in Australia. Staff celebrated Harmony Week with morning tea. Several staff members bought foods from countries they have a connection with.

We had 'Sacher Torte', a decadent chocolate cake with apricot filling. This is named after the Hotel Sacher in Vienna, Austria.

The brigadeiro is one of Brazil's most iconic sweets. It was created in the 1940s and named after a military officer, Brigadeiro Eduardo Gomes.

Lahmacun, a thin, delicious Armenian dessert was also bought for us to enjoy. We had soda bread and tea from Ireland and ANZAC biscuits, lamingtons and vegemite sandwiches from Australia.

The Man Cave

On 30th April, Year 9 boys at Mansfield Secondary College participated in The Man Cave, a transformative program designed to support emotional literacy, mental health awareness, and personal growth in young men. The results were nothing short of powerful—both in the statistics and the students' own words.

The Man Cave creates a safe, respectful space where boys can reflect on their values, challenge gender stereotypes, and connect authentically with their peers. When asked how the session impacted them, many students spoke about the experience of being heard and the realisation that they are not alone. One student shared, "It impacted me by seeing what people are going through and how similar they are to mine." Another commented on the realisation that, "I'm not the only one going through stuff."

The program's impact was evident in measurable changes. After participating, 94% of students reported feeling more aware of their own emotions, up from 81%. Confidence in expressing those emotions in a healthy way rose from 69% to 88%. Notably, students' awareness of where to seek professional help increased from 73% to 91%, and the number who felt comfortable asking school staff for help jumped from 50% to 82%.

Encouragingly, students are leaving with a greater sense of empathy and responsibility. One student reflected, "I want to support my friends or family if they are struggling," while another said, "I'll ask people if they are really OK and express myself."

The program also explored how gender stereotypes influence young men's emotional development. After the session, 94% reported understanding the impact of these stereotypes, and 100% expressed motivation to grow into healthier individuals.

Flourish Journey

The Flourish Girl program took place recently with the Year 9 girls. This youth-informed, evidence-based initiative is designed to foster self-awareness, emotional intelligence, and empathy, helping participants build meaningful connections—with themselves, their peers, families, and communities—in a safe and supportive environment.

Our facilitator, Mae, was exceptional in engaging with the students. She brought diverse life experiences, serving as an inspiring role model for all the girls. The day featured interactive modules and activities that empowered students with valuable tools for discussing important topics such as body image and judgment.

The Body Image module explored the factors that influence body perception, provided practical strategies to cultivate self-confidence and encouraged diversity through shared experiences. The Managing Judgments module guided the students in examining how judgments and labels shape perspectives, transforming negativity through self-compassion, and fostering empathy by recognizing and addressing biases.

It was reassuring to see many of the girls share similar feelings, strengthening their sense of connection. Opening up in such a supportive environment made the experience even more meaningful, reminding everyone that they weren't alone. The enthusiastic participation of all the girls enriched the discussions, creating an open and honest space where everyone felt heard

CAMPS, SPORTS, AND EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) helps eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you have a valid means-tested concession card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. Means-tested concession cards must be valid on the first day of Term 1, 2025 (Tuesday 28 January 2025) or Term 2, 2025 (Tuesday 22 April 2025).


A student aged 16 years and over who is considered a mature minor and holds a valid concession card is also eligible to apply.

Eligible families will receive a payment of \$256 per year for secondary school students. The funds will be paid directly to the school to be used towards camps, sports and excursion costs for the benefit of your child.

If you applied for CSEF through our school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year, unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.


