Dear Parents/Guardians,

Welcome to the last week of Term 3.



Last days for senior students:

In the rhythm of the school year, it is an important time, with our VCE Vocational Major and VCE students nearing the end of their secondary schooling year.

The Year 12 Vocational Major students have just completed their Upcycle Exhibition with part of their assessment focusing around their application of learnt skills to a real context, and the exhibition was the culmination of weeks of project-based learning.

Our academic students are concluding their studies, with just two weeks of classes left when we return for Term 4. The English exam is the first of the major external assessments, occurring on Tuesday 29th October.

During the holidays, the Senior School has organised a range of practice exams and revision opportunities. Our VCE staff are highly committed to the success of our students, and I commend them for the way in which they are structuring revision activities – our staff are our greatest asset.

Some of our students have already been receiving early offers for university courses, particularly from La Trobe, Deakin and Australian National Universities. It is interesting to look at the courses our students are going into, with a strong health-sciences focus this year. Most of the university offers come out in early December, with further rounds through to February, so lots of time to get students organised for their next step. Mt Buller Annex

This term, our Year 7 to 10 Annex students have taken part in an immersive educational adventure up here at Mt Buller. Despite facing some challenges, our time at the snow has been filled with learning, growth, and unique experiences.

The term began with the usual high hopes and eager anticipation. However, we were met with a season of particularly low snowfall, a stark reminder of the unpredictable nature of the environment. Despite these less-than-ideal conditions, our students displayed resilience and positivity, making the most of the conditions they were served up.



Unfortunately, the term brought with it some minor injuries for some students, but they all showed remarkable strength and determination to recover and get back on snow. The spirit of camaraderie and support within the group was most evident throughout Vic Interschools, as classmates cheered on and encouraged each other, allowing MSC to post some impressive results. The success continued to Nationals with many Annex students posting impressive results and three hitting the podium.

This term was not just about skiing and snowboarding. We took the opportunity to delve deeper into the world of snow sports, exploring various aspects that are often overlooked. One of the key learning areas was our study of ski boots and their construction. Students learned about the intricate process of making ski boots, from selecting the right materials to ensuring proper fit and comfort. This exploration gave them an appreciation for the equipment that is so vital to the activities they love. We also dove deep into the history of boot production and the countries who drove this industry. Additionally, our students explored the concept of international ski travel and its environmental impact. Discussions were held about the carbon footprint associated with long-distance travel, the use of resources at ski resorts, and the importance of sustainable tourism practices. These conversations sparked thoughtful debates and ideas on how we can all contribute to reducing our environmental impact while still enjoying the sport we love. Students used this knowledge to explore how we could design a more environmentally friendly ski resort.

Water and electricity, two fundamental components of ski resorts worldwide, were another focus of our studies. Students examined how these resources are utilized in snowmaking and daily operations at resorts like Mt Buller. They also learned about the challenges faced by resorts in managing these resources and had guest speakers talk to the class about the current challenges of restricted pumping rights.

A highlight of the term was our day at base with Mt Buller Ski Patrol. The students were fortunate to learn directly from the Patrollers who are on the front lines of ski safety. They practised basic first aid techniques, CPR, learned how to respond to emergencies on the slopes, and gained valuable insights into the responsibilities and skills required to be a Ski Patroller. This was a follow on from the session we did last year and further strengthened the relationship between the Annex and Ski Patrol while increasing students' respect for the important work done by the team.

As the season ground to a premature halt, we still had large numbers at class every day with creative carpooling from Mansfield delivering us our cohort. Students filled their non-skiing time on the hill with bush walks, exploration to bush huts and cooking time. Our 'Celebration' evening, although a week early, was one of the best in memory and the student's movies captured the 'grit in the face of adversity' attitude that underpinned the whole term. I'm very proud of the whole Annex cohort this year.

Adventure Challenge

Earlier this term, Adventure Challenge students ventured up to Mt Stirling to learn the fine art of cross country skiing. Under the expert guidance of Nigel Kain and Lisa Andreason, skills were taught on how to safely ascend and descend the beautiful snow covered trails that meander beneath the alpine ash. Most students were experiencing cross country skiing for the first time and were quick to learn various skills enabling the group to cover several kilometres of trails that looped from Telephone Box Junction up to the Machinery Shed shelter area. A focus of the trip was for the group to be considerate and supportive of one another whilst learning these new skills in challenging weather conditions. Students are to be congratulated on their effort, persistence and positivity throughout the day despite the cold and rainy conditions.



During theory sessions this term, students have been studying human impact on the Australian landscape and exploring this in our local region. A particular focus has been the health of our local waterways and what is being done to improve these environments. In week 8, the group travelled to a property on the Broken River to take part in a revegetation project. Experts from Landcare provided knowledge on why certain endemic species were used in specific areas to prevent erosion, create habitat for fauna and generally improve the health of this fragile river system. Students did a fantastic job in planting over 100 native grasses, which was appreciated by the property owner and Landcare staff.

Year 8 Humanities






The student's work and the view from the top made for a successful trip.


